Palmer's time in the U.S. Army at Fort Bragg helped assistance, a 100% zero eviction success rate, and more. establish her expertise in handling complex and nuanced situations. As a logistician, she learned how to manage supplies while ensuring the safety of more than 70 personnel in a combat deployment environment.

before losing her battle with breast cancer and seeing her father not be deterred by functioning in a wheelchair after being hit by a drunk driver, Palmer knew she had to do something more to help others in need.

"It was my divine calling to serve others through impact," recently selected to receive the GDVS said Palmer. She cofounded I Will Survive, Inc, a non-profit which provides economic support, prevention education, and health and wellness services to those at higher risk and those affected by breast cancer.

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VET FAIR ASSISTS HUNDREDS OF VETERANS IN NEWNAN

Over 400 veterans attended a Veterans Resource Fair on April 11, 2025 in Newnan. GDVS Veteran Service Officers from were on-site to provide assistance with claims and benefits at the event.

"We assisted 119 veterans and family members with questions about claims and state and federal veterans benefits. We were also able to file 68 disability or pension claims," said GDVS North Region Director Ken Childre.

GDVS Commissioner Dr. Patricia Ross and GDVS Executive Director of Field Operations and Appeals were also on-site to provide support. They helped support the team by responding to questions, looking up DD214s, scanning documents or escorting veterans to other agencies in attendance for additional resources.

"We are proud to work alongside Albany Technical College to expand our reach in Southwest Georgia. This new office represents a meaningful step forward in supporting our veteran community," said GDVS Commissioner Patricia Ross.

The office helps veterans and their families, caretakers, and survivors with a variety of state and federal benefits, including filing claims for disability compensation and pension, answering questions about educational benefits, and providing information on VA health care.

"Whether it's benefits assistance, guidance, or just a listening ear, we're here for our veterans every step of the way," said GDVS South Region Director Sherri Whitfield.

HONORING SERVICE : GEORGIAN RECEIVES FRENCH LEGION OF HONOR



Georgia WWII veteran and centenarian Alan Kinder was recently presented with France's highest decoration, the

French Legion of Honor, for his actions as part of the 14th Field Artillery Observation Battalion.

Kinder was presented the medal during a ceremony at the American Legion in Smyrna by French Consul General in Atlanta, Anne-Laure Desjonquères.

Kinder has sharp recollections of his military service during WWII, including the intense fighting during Battle of the Bulge and the day he almost lost his life when sheltering from the frigid weather in Luxembourg City.

Kinder returned to Normandy for the 80th anniversary of D-Day last year and plans to return in June to commemorate the Battle of the Bulge, which ended in January of 1945.
