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LEGACIES PRESERVED: VETERANS HONORED WITH DIGITAL MEMORIALS

"The grave marker of our veterans should not be their final remembrance," said Matt Quinn, Undersecretary of Memorial Affairs for the VA. Their legacy, he believes, will live on beyond the grave thanks to the Veterans Legacy Memorial.

The names and legacies of nearly 10 million veterans can be found on the VA's interactive website, which was launched in



2019. It contains the history of men and women who served our country honorably dating back to the Revolutionary War.

Veterans interred in VA national cemeteries, VA grant-funded cemeteries, Department of Defense managed cemeteries, and U.S. Park Service national cemeteries are automatically added to the site.

Recently, thousands of private cemeteries where veterans have received a VA-provided gravesite marker were added to the database. This brought in entries from nearly 5 million veterans to now be honored and remembered.

The site consists of individual pages for the veterans which include service branch, rank, war period, military record, honors, photos, and tributes. Visitors are encouraged to submit photos, post tributes, and learn about the veteran's military service.
