Georgia State Veterans Memorial Cemeteries



REQUIREMENTS FOR BURIAL

- 1. Anyone who is a veteran under the rules established by the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs, and was separated under other than dishonorable conditions, is eligible for burial in a GVMC.
- 2. Any member of the Reserves/National Guard who was eligible for retirement pay at the time of death, or would have been entitled to retired pay but for the fact that they were not at least 60 years of age, is eligible.
- **3.** Anyone who, as a member of the U.S. Armed Forces or a reserve component of the U.S. Armed Forces, died in the line of duty while on active duty, or active duty for training is eligible.
- 4. An eligible veteran's spouse may be interred in the same plot as the veteran at a GVMC.
- 5. The veteran's dependent (unmarried, under age 21, or life-long dependency on the veteran) is eligible. Documentation of eligibility is required.



The Georgia Veterans Memorial Cemeteries, established for the interment of faithful and honorable military veterans, are shrines recognizing all Georgia veterans who have served in the United States Armed Forces.

The cemeteries will be greatly revered, not only by the next of kin and family members of those interred therein, but also by patriotic, veteran, military, and civic organizations and the general public as well.

The cemeteries will be administered, operated, and maintained under the highest standards – standards that will require a high degree of vigilance and devotion.

We in the Georgia Department of Veterans Service accept this challenge with honor.

OTHER RULES

- 1. The non-veteran spouse/dependent will normally be buried with the veteran.
- 2. If the veteran has been buried in a plot for cremated remains, the non-veteran spouse/dependent <u>MUST</u> also choose a burial designated for cremated remains.
- **3.** A standard upright, granite government provided marker will be used to mark the grave for casket burials and in-ground cremations. A small granite cover will be used for cremated remains in the columbarium.

WHAT IS THE COST?

There is no charge for the plot, vault, grave markers, or use of the committal chapel for interment service for an eligible veteran or spouse.

WHAT IS PROVIDED?

- 1. Plot: Next available (no pre-selection)
- **2.** Plot: Next available space for cremated remains that are to be buried
- **3.** Niche: Next available for those that are cremated and placed in the columbarium wall
- **4.** Vault: Concrete Lined (double depth for vet and spouse/dependent)
- 5. Marker: Standard U.S. Government upright granite markers
- 6. Care: Perpetual care provided by the State

Department Organization



Veterans Service Board

The Constitution of the State of Georgia specifies the State Board of Veterans Service be composed of seven members. By law each member must be a veteran of the Armed Forces of the United States and must have served honorably during wartime.

The Governor appoints members who are subject to approval by the State Senate. Board members' terms are staggered and are for seven years. From its membership, the Board annually elects a chairman, vice-chairman, and secretary. Every four years the Board elects a Commissioner, through whom it controls the overall policy of the Department of Veterans Service.

The mission of the Department of Veterans Service is to serve the 773,337 veterans residing in Georgia, their dependents and survivors in all matters pertaining to veterans benefits.

This responsibility falls into two basic tasks: informing veterans and their families about veterans benefits; and directly assisting and advising veterans and their families in securing the benefits to which they are entitled.

To support these missions, the department maintains a claims division, field offices, two veterans nursing homes, two veterans cemeteries, and an information division.

The Claims Division's mission is to process claims and appeals of Georgia veterans. phrase "duplication of effort" when referring to the functions of the Department of Veterans Service and the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs; nothing could be further from the truth. MISSIONS:

To assist Georgia's 773,337 veterans with benefits claims to obtain compensation, pension and services from the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs (VA).

To provide nursing home care to veteran patients at the Augusta and Milledgeville state veterans homes.

To provide memorial benefits to Georgia's veterans who served faithfully and honorably in the armed forces of our nation and to their families at the Glennville and Milledgeville state veterans cemeteries that are shrines to the memory of our state's heroes.

VISION:

We will provide the highest quality assistance to Georgia's veterans to aid them in obtaining all the benefits from the federal and state governments to which they are entitled.

We will provide the highest quality nursing home services to Georgia's veteran patients, as judged by VA surveys, state inspections and other accrediting agencies.

We will provide shrine standard services at Georgia's state veterans cemeteries to memorialize our state's fallen and deceased heroes who faithfully and honorably served in the armed forces.

VALUES:

We value the service Georgia's veterans have provided to our nation and our state in the armed forces of our nation and the freedoms we all enjoy because of that service.

We value the ongoing partnership our state has with the VA to provide assistance and service to Georgia's veterans and their families.

VA, the role played by the Department of Veterans Service might be compared to that of an attorney representing a client in court.

The necessity for personal assistance in filing and pursuing claims and in maintaining a continuing information program results from the legal principle that veterans benefits are not awarded automatically – all must be applied for.

The VA pays a veteran exactly what he or she applies for when they are entitled, and no more. The aim of the Department of Veterans Service is to

The Field Offices, located throughout the state, provide direct assistance to veterans at the local level. The department representatives provide counsel and assist veterans in gathering the documents and information required to support their claims.

The veterans nursing homes provide skilled nursing care to Georgia's war veterans who need those services.

The veterans cemeteries provide final resting places for Georgia's veterans and their spouses and serve as shrines to their memory and their service to our nation.

The Information Division's mission is to keep Georgia veterans informed about these issues.

The uninformed may be prone to use the

obtain for a veteran or dependents the benefits to which they are entitled, to tell them when they are entitled, and to assist them in gathering and preparing evidence needed to justify a claim and prove their entitlement.

The advancing age of Korean and Vietnam War veterans, and the frequent changes that occur in veterans benefits legislation, will necessitate the continuance of a variety of veterans programs in the years ahead.

As Congress continues to seek ways to reduce the deficit, veterans benefits will continue to be in a state of flux.

This means veterans will continue to need assistance in interpreting the changes and determining how they impact their personal situation.

Department Functions

•Effectuate and carry out the laws of the state pertaining to veterans.

♦ Inform veterans, their dependents, and survivors as to their rights and benefits under federal and state legislation, or local ordinances.
♦ Assist veterans, their dependents, and their beneficiaries in the preparation, presentation,

proof, and establishment of such claims, privileges, rights and other benefits accruing to them under federal, state, and local laws.

♦ Report any evidence of incompetence, dishonesty, or negligence on the part of any employee dealing with veterans' affairs.

♦ Do everything possible to promote and protect

the rights of Georgia's veterans under federal and state law.

♦ Apply for and accept gifts, grants, and other contributions from the federal government or from any other governmental units.

♦ Construct and operate nursing homes and personal care homes for the benefit of eligible war veterans.

♦Construct and operate state veterans cemeteries for the benefit of eligible veterans and their dependents.

Advise the Governor, the Board of Veterans Service, and the General Assembly as to needed veterans' legislation.

♦ Maintain files on all veterans who have filed claims for veterans' benefit through the department.

◆Conduct educational programs by personal appearances before veterans' organizations, service clubs, fraternal groups and other such organizations so as to acquaint the public generally with the work of the department. ◆Make representatives of the department available throughout the state to assist all veterans, their dependents, and survivors in preparing and filing claims for benefits and to acquaint them with all legal rights and privileges. Cooperate with all national, state, and local governmental and private agencies, securing or offering services or any benefits to veterans and their dependents.

Veterans Education and Training Division (State Approving Agency)

B y law, the Georgia Department of Veterans Service is designated as the State Approving Agency, responsible for approving and supervising all institutions and establishments in Georgia, which offer education and training under the provisions of the Veterans Educational Assistance Program.

The State Approving Agency has the function of ensuring that approved institutions and establishments meet and maintain acceptable standards so that eligible persons who attend may receive educational assistance from the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs.

This includes all public and private schools and all establishments offering apprenticeship and other on-the-job training. The satisfactory performance of these duties requires extensive knowledge in education administration and understanding the laws and regulations that govern and control the Veterans Educational Assistance Program.

Georgia veterans enrolled in college degree and professional programs, technical career programs, vocational programs, to include flight training and on-the-job training programs exceeded 24,000 during 2011.

The Montgomery GI Bill education program, initiated in 1985, remains a great success. This program expanded the education benefits program to include vocational, technical, flight, correspondence, and apprenticeship training for reservists and veterans.

"The Post-9/11 Veterans Education Assistance Act of 2008," the newest education benefit program expanded the benefits available to certain service members and veterans with active duty military service after September 11, 2001. This GI Bill program was implemented on August 1, 2009. More than 16,000 Georgia veterans used this GI Bill during 2011.

Congress passed the Post 9/11 Veterans Educational Assistance Improvements Act of 2010 and it was signed by the president. This bill makes significant improvements such as adding OJT/Apprenticeship and Non-College degree schools, Vocational schools and Flight schools to what is covered under the Post 9/11 GI Bill. The changes were effective October 1, 2011.

This new GI Bill has been described as "the most comprehensive education benefits package since the original GI Bill was signed into law in 1944." For veterans qualified at the 100% tier, the program pays tuition and fees, a housing allowance, and a book stipend.

The Department of Defense has approved a "Transferability of Education Benefits" option for the Post – 9/11 GI Bill. This is a DOD retention program requiring active duty veterans to commit to a four year extension to their six or more year active duty commitment. DOD eligibility requirements must be met.

In 2011, the approval of educational institutions and training establishments for the education of Georgia veterans resulted in the processing of 7,000 individual actions in the approval, re-approval, withdrawal and compliance survey process. The State Approving Agency also conducted regular inspection visits to ensure that approval criteria and schools' standards of progress are being followed as prescribed by law. The SAA will begin conducting compliance survey inspections in FY 2012 using VA standards.

During 2011, personnel assigned to the Veterans Educational and Training Division conducted about 400 visits for the purpose of approval, re-approval, inspection and compliance surveys. Currently, the department monitors more than 1,500 educational institutions and training establishments.

In 2011, GDVS continued to expand opportunities for Georgia veterans to receive their Education Benefits while enrolled in approved On-The-Job Training (OJT) and Apprenticeship programs. For more information on all GI Bill programs go to: www.gibill.va.gov.

Public Information Division

he Public Information Division collects, evaluates, and disseminates information to veterans regarding benefits changes in laws, and proper procedures to be followed in the filing of claims.

When appropriate, the division mails news and information releases concerning veterans

affairs to newspapers, radio and television stations throughout Georgia.

The releases are used to inform veterans about the latest changes regarding veterans affairs and to provide information on the status of proposed or pending legislation which may affect them



Public speaking forums are an important ingredient of the department's overall information program. All department personnel are encouraged to accept speaking engagements at meetings of veterans organizations and civic clubs. These personal appearances provide excellent opportunities for telling the veterans benefits story. Department personnel also participate in local radio talk shows and make presentations at local schools.

The Public Information Division compiles, edits, and publishes a series of pamphlets explaining in detail the various benefits available to veterans, their dependents, and survivors. These pamphlets are updated as changes occur in laws, regulations, or benefits.

Through an aggressive internal

GWVNH-Augusta

The Georgia War Veterans Nursing Home (GWVNH) in Augusta is a 192-bed skilled nursing care facility

provided 57,885 days of care to Georgia's veterans with an average age of 81. During the year, there were 214 admissions and 225

located adjacent to the campus of the Georgia Health Sciences University. formally known as the Medical College of Georgia. The facility is also adjacent to the Charlie Norwood Veterans Affairs Medical Center. It is operated under an interagency agreement between



discharges with an average length of stay of 312 days. Services to patients included 4,990 physical therapy treatments and 3.839 individual occupational therapy procedures. Veteran patients were treated by a medical director and family medicine residents providing

the Georgia Department of Veterans Service and the Georgia Health Sciences University.

Primarily, the facility provides medical and nursing services to Georgia's aged and infirm veterans. GWVNH also serves as a teaching facility to acquaint medical, pharmacy and allied health students with the medical conditions and diseases of the aged. This provides students with practical experience and helps them gain expertise in treating the disabled and the elderly.

In addition, the facility also houses a Georgia Department of Veterans Service field office that serves veterans of Richmond and Columbia counties.

Dedicated in 1969, the facility was the first of its kind in the nation to be built with financial grant assistance from the federal government. It is one of a select group of such institutions that is accredited by the Joint Commission.

In fiscal year 2010, the nursing home

daily physician coverage. Other services were provided by a certified activities therapist and staff, two facility social workers and a staff of registered, licensed practical nurses and certified nursing assistants.

To help provide care and treatment, the federal government through the Department of Veterans Affairs provided financial assistance totaling in excess of \$4.9 million during 2010.

Due to budget reductions, there was a five-month moratorium placed on admissions, resulting in a reduced patient census. In January 2011 the moratorium was lifted and admissions resumed, and continue currently.

Throughout the year, veteran service organizations, civic and fraternal organizations and religious groups demonstrated their concern for the well being of veteran patients through numerous donations, visits, and sponsorship of frequent activities for GWVNH residents.

GWVH-Milledgeville

he Georgia War Veterans Home, situated on approximately 17 acres in Milledgeville, is a 550-bed facility

The Office of Regulatory Services of the Georgia Department of Human Resources conducted an unannounced licensure survey of

licensed and certified to provide skilled nursing care to aged and infirm Georgia war veterans. United Veteran Services of Georgia, Inc., a subsidiary of UHS-Pruitt Corporation of Norcross, operates the home for the Department of Veterans Service under a contractual agreement.



each skilled nursing unit of the home in October and found no deficiencies. The U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs conducted its annual survey in July; the home was determined to be in compliance with VA standards and was certified for continued operation as a state veterans

The home operated three skilled nursing care facilities in 2011, which included the Richard B. Russell Building with 126 budgeted beds; the Joe T Wood Building with 150 budgeted beds; and the Alzheimer's Wing of the Pete Wheeler Building with 20 budgeted beds.

The GDVS field office serving Baldwin, Hancock, Putnam, Washington, and Wilkinson counties is housed on the first floor of the Vinson Building. Veteran-related contacts for this field office totaled 15,744 for 2011. This office also serves the 250 veterans of the Georgia War Veterans Home by assisting with compensation and pension claims, counseling services, and family-related issues.

Construction projects at the Georgia War Veterans Home for 2011 consisted of the Alzheimer's Unit 24-bed addition and "C" Wing renovation to the Wheeler Building (\$3,222,183), renovation to the Wheeler Building for a VA Community-Based Outpatient Clinic, Russell Building heat exchange repairs (\$393,495), and HVAC and facility upgrades to the Wood Building (\$264,340). home.

In 2011, veteran patients at the home received 79,271 days of skilled nursing care. The nursing home admitted 99 patients during the year and had 13 discharges. The average length of stay for current skilled veteran patients is 1,230 days.

Federal assistance in funding a portion of the cost of providing care to veterans in the home amounted to \$7,055,432.12. As in previous years, many veterans service organizations, civic groups, and church groups continued their sponsorship of numerous activities such as movies, games, dance parties, bingo, picnics, and other activities and programs for the general well-being of the veteran patients at the home. Groups and individuals that comprised the equivalent of 1,576 individual volunteers providing in excess of 3,656 hours of time valued at over \$78,092.00 presented over 710 activities during the year.

The value of in-kind donations made available to the home was \$35,195.34. Groups and individuals also provided direct monetary donations of \$29,497.33 in the year.

GVMC-Milledgeville

eorgia Veterans Memorial Cemetery at Milledgeville is located approximately 5 miles

the front entrance of the cemetery in recognition of Memorial Day. The Knights of Columbus, Patriot Guard, and members of the 48th Infantry

south of downtown Milledgeville along Georgia Highway 112. This cemetery, established on 142 acres the Georgia Department of Veterans Service received from the Georgia Forestry Commission, includes an administration/visitor center with a state of the art information

booth, a committal chapel, a carillon, and 12 columbarium shelters for cremations. Cemetery grounds also include a six-acre lake and a three-acre, multi-tier walled ceremonial area available for use by veterans organizations on remembrance days, such as Memorial Day and Veterans Day.

Presently occupying 50 of the 142 acres, the cemetery will eventually be the final resting place for more than 100,000 eligible veterans, their spouses, and eligible dependents.

There were 197 burials in 2011, making the total-to-date 1,730 veterans, spouses, and dependents buried at the GVMC. The burials are composed of 1,217 casketed burials, 290 cremations in the columbarium, 205 in-ground cremations, and 18 memorial markers.

The avenue of flags is displayed when ceremonies are held at the cemetery, such as Memorial Day and Wreaths Across America. In addition, it is displayed on Flag Day, Independence Day, and Veterans Day.

On May 10, 2011, the cemetery hosted a rededication ceremony formally completing the Phase II expansion of the cemetery. This expansion included an additional 1,965 spaces for casket and cremation burials. Approximately 150 people attended the ceremony.

Flags were placed on all burial sites and at



Brigade conducted a ceremony attended by approximately 200 people.

On December 10, 2011, the cemetery hosted its seventh annual Wreaths Across America ceremony honoring our past and present military. Seven wreaths were presented honoring each branch of our Armed

Forces, Merchant Marines and POWs/MIAs. The ceremony included members of the Patriot Guard Riders, cadets from the Augusta Composite Squadron Civil Air Patrol, and representatives from each branch of service. Approximately 200 people attended the ceremony. The Worcester Wreath Company provided the seven wreaths for the ceremony. The cemetery received approximately 400 donated wreaths, which were placed on graves following the ceremony.

The cemetery has many visitors each year. Some are visiting grave sites, some are seeking information about the cemetery and burial requirements, and many have just heard about the cemetery and want to see the grounds. Notable visitors this year included Governor Nathan Deal and First Lady Sandra Deal.

Cemetery staff members remain active in the local community by meeting frequently with business groups, veterans organizations, and church groups. The cemetery staff also provided an information display at the department's annual Supermarket of Benefits, which was held in Dalton in December 2011.

The GVMC's hours of operation are Monday through Friday 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m., excluding official state holidays. The cemetery is open to families, visitors and the general public seven days each week from 8 a.m. to dusk.

GVMC-Glennville

The Georgia Veterans Memorial Cemetery – Glennville is situated on the 42.6- acre site of the former country. The ceremony was held in conjunction with the Glennville American Legion post and the Glennville Veterans of Foreign Wars post.

Dyess Farm, just north of the Glennville city limits on U.S. Highway 301, 25 miles west of the main post of Fort Stewart. The initial 26-acre phase of the cemetery contains 1,400 pre-placed in-ground double vaults, for eligible veterans, their spouses, and eligible dependents; 766 conventional single depth sites; 1,384

cremation internment sites, which include a columbarium and in-ground sites; and 429 spaces for memorial markers. These memorial markers are placed in memory of those veterans whose remains are unavailable for burial.

A key feature of the cemetery is the colocation of the Glennville Veterans Service Office in the Administration Building and Visitor Center. This office provides assistance to veterans and their families with applications for veterans benefits and claims. The office provides service to veterans and their families in Bryan, Liberty, Long, Tattnall, and Wayne counties.

GVMC – Glennville was dedicated on November 28, 2007, and will eventually be the final resting place for more than 21,000 veterans, their spouses, and eligible dependents. As of December 31, 2011, there were 392 veterans, spouses, and family members interned in the cemetery. State veterans cemeteries such as the GVMC – Glennville are an integral part of the VA's National Cemetery System. The requirements for burial are the same for all National Cemetery System cemeteries.

In 2011, the Georgia Veterans Memorial Cemetery – Glennville hosted its annual Memorial Day ceremony to honor veterans who paid the ultimate sacrifice in service of our Director Ernie Cowart gave a short speech about Memorial Day and covered the beginnings of the holiday to its place in today's world. Over 150 people attended. For Memorial Day and Veterans Day, Boy Scout Troop 929 placed American flags at the grave sites of the veterans interned in the cemetery. In December, the Bonaventure Children of the American Revolution Society sponsored a Wreaths Across America ceremony to place wreaths at all the interment sites in the cemetery. The Air Force JROTC of Effingham County High School took part in the ceremony and provided the color guard. A bugler from Bugles Across America provided a live version of "Taps." Also involved in the ceremony were members of the Brunswick Civil Air Patrol and area Boy Scouts. A crowd of more than 125 people attended the ceremony and then helped place wreaths at the graves.

Cemetery staff members remain active in the local community by meeting frequently with business groups, veterans organizations, and other various groups.

GVMC – Glennville's hours of operation are Monday through Friday 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m., excluding official state holidays. The cemetery is open to families, visitors and the general public seven days each week from 8 a.m. to dusk.

COMPENSATION AND PENSION:

Claims for monetary benefits submitted by veterans, their dependents or survivors.

EDUCATION: Applications for educational assistance for the veterans and/or wives, widows and children of veterans.

MEDICAL: Applications for treatment of a medical or dental condition; for admission to health care facilities; and vocational rehabilitation.

INSURANCE: An application for insurance, conversion, reinstatement, waiver of premiums, total disability income and death proceeds.

HOME LOAN APPLICATION:

Applications for direct home loans from the VA and guaranteed loans from private lenders.

POWERS OF ATTORNEY: The

appointment of a service organization as a claimant's representative.

NOTICES OF DISAGREEMENT AND APPEALS FILED: Written briefs and statements prepared in support of a claim where there is disagreement with the VA decision rendered.

VA CLAIMS FOLDERS REVIEWED:

Claims obtained from the VA adjudication division and reviewed and rating boards conducted by claims staff personnel.

DRIVERS LICENSES: Certificates issued to veterans, their spouses, or to widows or widowers of veterans for obtaining a veteran's or honorary driver's license.

BUSINESS LICENSES: Certificates issued to certain disabled veterans exempting them from the payment of business license taxes.

OTHER FORMS AND EVIDENCE:

Documents completed and transmitted in support of applications filed for claims.

MISCELLANEOUS: Assisting in arrangements for military funerals, burial in national cemeteries, obtaining flags and grave markers, ambulance service, guardianship for incompetent veterans and orphans; replacement of lost or destroyed discharges and military records; review and change of discharges and military records; employment, reemployment, civil service preference, social security, welfare and related benefits; claims from the field reviewed and released to the VA; actions pertaining to DV auto tags, hunting and fishing licenses, tax exemptions, state park discount cards and change of addresses; vocational rehabilitation; and nursing home applications.

Compensation and Pension: Represents returns in dollars for veterans compensation for service-connected disability, compensation for service-connected deaths for veterans dependents, veterans dependency and indemnity compensation for service-connected deaths, pensions for nonservice connected disability for veterans, pensions to veterans surviving spouses and children, and burial expenses allowance for veterans.

Insurance: Estimate of VA payment of death claims, mature endowments, dividends, cash surrender payments, total disability income provision payments, and total permanent disability benefits payments. The data is provided by the VA Regional Office and Insurance Center in Philadelphia. The estimate is based on statistical allocations using the veteran population to disperse amounts to geographical locations.

Readjustment and Vocational Rehabilitation:

Represents returns in dollars for automobiles and adaptive equipment for certain disabled veterans and members of the Armed Forces, specially adapted housing for disabled veterans, dependents education assistance (Chapter 35), vocational rehabilitation for disabled veterans (Chapter 31), post-Vietnam Era veterans educational assistance (Chapter 32), and the Montgomery G.I. Bill for Selected Reserves (Chapter 106).

General Operating Costs: Amount spent by the VA to operate the regional office, hospitals, nursing and domiciliary facilities and clinics in Georgia.

Thank you for the opportunity to share with you some of the accomplishments and events that took place at the Atlanta Regional Office during fiscal year 2011 which ended on September 30, 2011. As each year passes they seem to get busier and busier.

During fiscal year 2011 we were pleased to be selected to participate in pilot programs designed to improve service and benefit delivery to Veterans. These initiatives were a Quality Review Team that focused on method to improve the quality of decision-making and the Simplified Notification Letter initiative that reduced the length of the decision notification letter sent to Veterans allowing for more decisions to be processed. We are proud to have taken part in these pilots and both initiatives are now implemented nationwide.

Veterans Service Center

During FY 2011, the Veterans Service Center (VSC) completed 28,355 rating claims with an average of 257 days to complete a claim. This level of productivity exceeded the established target of (26,663) by 6.3 percent. In FY 2012, the VSC will continue our focus on increasing the number of rating claims completed in order to address the number of projected claim receipts. The VSC is also focusing on reducing the rating inventory pending more than 125 days as well as claims pending over one year, homeless Veterans claims, and improving the accuracy of our decisions.

Last year, the Atlanta VSC received 37,603 claims, which represents a 10.5 percent decrease in claims received compared to the same period in FY 2011.

The Atlanta VSC conducted three (3) Yellow Ribbon events in 2011. These events provided assistance to one hundred fifty (150) Army and Marine Corps Veterans along with their families. Additionally, four hundred four (404) briefings

were conducted providing over fourteen thousand three hundred thirty-two (14, 332) service members information on VA benefits. Atlanta has signed up 1,049 Veterans to eBenefits from October 1, 2011 through December 31, 2011, and we will continue to seek new methods and opportunities to inform Veterans of our services and benefits to which they are entitled. In October 2011 the RO assisted the Decatur VAMC with the Homeless Veterans Standown, which provided medical care and benefit assistance to more than four hundred twenty five (425) Veterans.

Last FY we expedited all claims pending as a result of a court decision that allowed us to grant service connected disability compensation to Vietnam era veterans on a presumptive basis for the following disabilities: Ischemic Heart Disease, Parkinson's disease, and Hairy cell Leukemia. We processed over 2,000 of these claims for Georgia Veterans.

In FY 2011, the Atlanta RO expanded its Integrated Disability Evaluation System (IDES) program to Fort Gordon. The IDES program was previously available at Fort Stewart, Fort Benning, Moody Air Force Base and Robins Air Force Base. The IDES program is designed to expedite payment of VA benefits after service members are separated from service. The program incorporates a single disability rating decision and a single disability rating by the VA.

In FY 2011, the Atlanta RO was chosen to pilot the new rating Simplified Notification Letter (SNL) program. The new SNL revises the rating process to simplify, standardize, and streamline the decision documentation and notification processes. The pilot demonstrated that more Veterans could be served using this streamlined process. The Atlanta RO processed an average of 3,445 rating claims during the last four months of FY 2011 using the new SNL process.

Education

The Atlanta Regional Processing Office (RPO) is responsible for 17.1% of the nationwide education benefits workload.

The RPO processed 561,079 claims in FY2011. Average Days to Complete for original claims processing went from 53.1 days in FY2010 to 29.5 days in FY2011, a decrease of 44.4%. Average Days to Complete for supplemental claims processing decreased from 17.8 days in FY2010 to 12.9 days in FY2011, resulting in a decrease of 27.5%. Several procedural changes for the Post-9/11 GI Bill (Chapter 33) were implemented during the year. Additionally, new legislation was passed which expanded eligibility under Chapter 33 to individuals receiving benefits for non-college degree (NCD), apprenticeship, on-the-job training (OJT), and for service under Title 32 Section 502(f) effective October 1, 2011.

Chapter 33 continued to impact processing during FY2011. Unlike other education benefits, Chapter 33 sends the tuition and fee payments directly to the school or facility. Chapter 33 returned checks (from the schools when students alter their schedules) significantly impacted both Education and Finance in that cases often required extensive review and audit of benefits paid. This function was consolidated to Debt Management Center (DMC) in December of 2011, which should allow the division to divert resources to routine claims processing.

In the area of Customer Service, the RPO assisted 27,719 students via Internet inquiries and interviewed 4,869 students visiting the RPO. Telephone inquiries regarding education benefits are processed in the Educational Call Center located in Muskogee, Oklahoma. The Outreach Section of the Education Division presented information at twenty-six (26) Outreach events during 2011 that provided information to school certifying officials and veterans.

Loan Guaranty

Fiscal Year 2011 realized the completion of the previous year's initiative to consolidate the national Certificate of Eligibility function from Winston-Salem, NC to the Atlanta Regional Loan Center (RLC). The Atlanta RLC now has full responsibility for this function for all of our nation's veterans and participating lenders.

The Atlanta RLC continued to lead the nation in number of VA loans closed with 57,727. This accomplishment represents more than five consecutive years leading the nation in this category. During this period, the Atlanta RLC generated approximately 17% of all VA loans closed nationally. During FY 2011, our Construction & Valuation Section processed 49,921 appraisal requests that also ranked first among the eight Regional Loan Centers.

Our Loan Production and Loan Administration staffs continued to provide training and outreach to veterans, lenders, and real estate professional involved in this worthy benefit. During this past year, we attended over 28 outreach events and had direct contact with over 1,450 program participants. We again enjoyed our participation in Mr. Wheeler's Supermarket Event for Veterans, and we will continue to support this event in the future.

Our Loan Administration staff assisted 4,250 veterans and their families in avoiding foreclosure through one of our successful alternatives. We approved 146 Specially Adapted Housing (SAH) grants totaling \$7.36 million dollars to our most deserving disabled veterans. The delivery of the SAH grant benefit continues to be our most rewarding accomplishment and our highest priority.

We look forward to the challenges of the upcoming year with confidence that our management staff and employees will meet them head-on with an "ICARE"

Attitude and enormous respect and gratitude for the sacrifices of the veterans we serve.

Vocational Rehabilitation and Employment

The Vocational Rehabilitation and Employment Division (VR&E) continues to be active in establishing early intervention strategies with service members preparing for discharge from active duty. These activities including ongoing efforts with the Coming Home to Work (CHTW) program at Fort Gordon (Augusta), GA, Fort Benning (Columbus), GA, and Fort Stewart (Savannah), GA. The Coming Home to Work program targets active duty service members who are within six months of being discharged; with emphasis on those who are in a medical hold status. VR&E staff is able to begin the steps of the Chapter 31 initial assessment, entitlement determination, adjustment counseling, vocational exploration, and other preparations for their eventual discharge from active duty.

The Atlanta VR&E office maintains an active workload, which is the fourth largest in the nation, with an average open case count of approximately 4,200. In FY 2011, this VR&E office received 4,095 applications for Chapter 31, VR&E services. This first quarter of FY 2012 produced 958 applications for these services and, the Division continues to assist veterans in returning to suitable, competitive employment.

The provision of Independent Living services continued to grow during FY 2011. The program targets veterans whose disabilities would prevent them from participating in competitive employment. Program goals are targeted for independent functioning in the home and community, to the maximum extent possible.

Conclusion

As we start a new year, our goal continues to improve the service we provide to Georgia Veterans. We are striving to become advocates for our Veterans and their families. I am thankful for the collaborative relationship we have in our effort to improve the services provided to Georgia Veterans. I look forward to this relationship continuing and only growing stronger. As always, we look forward to working with you and your staff serving our Veterans in 2012.

In June of 2011, the State of Georgia finished its 91st DAV Convention held in Columbus Georgia. The elections conducted brought together a great team to continue the time honored tradition of building better lives for our disabled veterans and their families for the future. Under this new leadership a motto was developed to ensure continuity among the state's members and chapters. That motto is "Service those who have served." It is with this motto that Georgia DAV Members can rally around so that all levels within our department will maintain the high standards of professionalism that veterans and their families have come to know and understand. It will be through this unity of effort that communities will be saturated with information and good works associated with the DAV.

I would like to share with you the results of the past year. Our National Service Officers are some of the best in this nation and their activities for the fiscal years 2011- 2012 include reviewing over 4280 files. These outstanding comrades received over 1545 New Power Attorneys; conducted 3417 interview; in excess of 3212 Rating Board Appearances, and filed 2795 New Claims. These actions along with other office activities result in total office activities of 15,630.

Additionally, we have netted a total of \$253,644,398.00 in Retro and Annual awards for new service connection, compensation increase, pension and other VA benefits to include compensation maintenance and educational benefits. During the months of June through November 2011, we conducted 212 Mobile Service Office stops (to include Harley-Davidson Stops).

Another important position within our department is our van transportation network managed by three Hospital Service Coordinators (HSC). These HSCs are talented and resourceful when assisting veterans with transportation needs. The Department of Georgia's transportation network covers 65 counties and 11 counties in South Carolina.

We have 29 vans which are put to good use by transporting veterans at each of Georgia's VA hospitals in Decatur, Augusta and Dublin. Over 150 van drivers donated over 191,261 hours and drove 145,037 miles to assist over 12,000 veterans. The Department of Georgia supports six VA hospitals, Decatur, Augusta, Dublin Georgia; Charleston, South Carolina; Florida and Tuskegee Alabama.

Our upcoming events include the Department's Spring Conference March 16-18, 2012, and finally our Department Convention to be conducted May 30-June 3, 2012. All events will be held at the Marriott City Center, in Macon Ga.

Thank you for contacting me regarding the Dobbins Air Reserve Base Commissary. It is good to hear from you.

As you are aware, the Defense Commissary Agency (DECA) has approved the construction of a commissary at Dobbins. While the Air Force has not yet programmed funding for this commissary, I will continue to work to obtain funding for this facility. Until funding is provided, I will work to keep existing commissaries at either Fort McPherson or Fort Gillem open so that military members and retirees in the Atlanta area will have access to a commissary.

On April 13th, I joined Senator Isakson and several Georgia Congressmen in a letter expressing our concerns to Secretary McHugh. While we realize that maintaining a commissary at either Fort Gillem or Fort McPherson following their closure requires specific approval, we believe we must preserve easy access to this benefit for our military constituents in the Atlanta area until the Dobbins facility opens. Additionally, Senator Isakson, Congressman Gingrey and I wrote the Chief of Staff of the Air Force, General Norton Schwartz, in March encouraging him to include funding for the Dobbins commissary in an up-coming Air Force budget request.

Pete, I certainly understand how crucial an accessible commissary is for the thousands of veterans and military personnel in the Atlanta area. I can think of no higher priority than caring for our nation's servicemembers and veterans. Please continue to stay in touch as this issue develops. As always, thank you for your dedicated service and valued leadership in the state of Georgia.

VA Priority Groups

The number of veterans who can be enrolled in the health care program is determined by the amount of money Congress gives VA each year. Since funds are limited, VA set up Priority Groups to make sure that certain groups of veterans are able to be enrolled before others.

Once you apply for enrollment, your eligibility will be verified. Based on your specific eligibility status, you will be assigned a Priority Group. The Priority Groups range from 1-8 with 1 being the highest priority for enrollment. Some veterans may have to agree to pay copay to be placed in certain Priority Groups.

You may be eligible for more than one Enrollment Priority Group. In that case, VA will always place you in the highest Priority Group that you are eligible for. Under the Medical Benefits Package, the same services are generally available to all enrolled veterans.VA determines your eligibility for VA's comprehensive medical benefits package through its patient enrollment system, which is based on Priority Groups from 1 through 8.

Priority Group 1

♦ Veterans with VA Service-connected disabilities rated 50% or more.

•Veterans assigned a total disability rating for compensation based on unemployability.

Priority Group 2

♦ Veterans with VA Service-connected disabilities rated 30% or 40%.

Priority Group 3

♦ Veterans who are former POWs.

♦ Veterans awarded the Purple Heart Medal.

♦ Veterans awarded the Medal of Honor.

•Veterans whose discharge was for a disability incurred or aggravated in the line of duty.

♦ Veterans with VA Service-connected disabilities rated 10% or 20%.

♦ Veterans awarded special eligibility classification under Title 38, U.S.C., § 1151, "benefits for individuals disabled by treatment or vocational rehabilitation."

Priority Group 4

♦ Veterans receiving increased compensation or pension based on their need for regular Aid and Attendance or by reason of being permanently Housebound.

•Veterans determined by VA to be catastrophically disabled.

Priority Group 5

♦Nonservice-connected Veterans and noncompensable Service-connected Veterans rated 0%, whose annual income and/or net worth are not greater than the VA financial thresholds.

♦ Veterans receiving VA Pension benefits.

♦ Veterans eligible for Medicaid benefits.

Priority Group 6

♦ Compensable 0% Service-connected Veterans.
