VALUES:

We value the service Georgia's veterans have provided to our nation and our state in the armed forces of our nation and the freedoms we all enjoy because of that service.

We value the ongoing partnership our state has with the VA to provide assistance and service to Georgia's veterans and their families.

VETERANS SERVICE BOARD

The Constitution of the State of Georgia specifies the State Board of Veterans Service be composed of seven members. By law each member must be a veteran of the Armed Forces of the United States and must have served honorably during wartime.

The Governor appoints members who are subject to approval by the State Senate. Board members' terms are staggered and are for seven years. From its membership, the Board annually elects a chairman, vice-chairman, and secretary. Every four years the Board elects a Commissioner, through whom it controls the overall policy of the Department of Veterans Service.

GEORGIA DEPARTMENT OF VETERANS SERVICE Serving Those Who Served

he mission of the Department of Veterans Service is to serve the 774,000+ veterans residing in Georgia, their dependents and survivors in all matters pertaining to veterans benefits.

This responsibility falls into two basic tasks: informing veterans and their families about veterans benefits; and directly assisting and advising veterans and their families in securing the benefits to which

they are entitled.

To support these missions, the department maintains a claims division, field offices, two veterans nursing homes, two veterans cemeteries, and a public information division.

The Claims Division's mission is to process claims and appeals of Georgia veterans.

The Field Offices, located throughout the

state, provide direct assistance to veterans at the local level. The department representatives provide counsel and assist veterans in gathering the documents and information required to support their claims.

The veterans nursing homes provide skilled nursing care to Georgia's war veterans who need those services.

The veterans cemeteries provide final resting places for Georgia's veterans and their spouses and serve as shrines to their memory and their service to our nation.

The Public Information Division's mission is to keep Georgia veterans informed about these issues.

The uninformed may be prone to use the phrase "duplication of effort" when referring to the functions of the Department of Veterans Service and the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs; nothing could be further from the truth.

To a veteran seeking benefits from the VA, the role played by the Department of Veterans Service might be compared to that of an attorney representing a client in court.

The necessity for personal assistance in filing and pursuing claims and in maintaining a continuing

> information program results from the legal principle that veterans benefits are not awarded automatically – all must be applied for.

The VA pays a veteran exactly what he or she applies for when they are entitled, and no more. The aim of the Department of Veterans Service is to obtain for a veteran or dependents the benefits to which they are entitled, to tell

them when they are entitled, and to assist them in gathering and preparing evidence needed to justify a claim and prove their entitlement.

The advancing age of Korean and Vietnam War veterans, and the frequent changes that occur in veterans benefits legislation, will necessitate the continuance of a variety of veterans programs in the years ahead.

As Congress continues to seek ways to reduce the deficit, veterans benefits will continue to be in a state of flux.

This means veterans will continue to need assistance in interpreting the changes and determining how they impact their personal situation.



GEORGIA DEPARTMENT OF **VETERANS SERVICE** <u>Department Functions</u>

Effectuate and carry out the laws of the state pertaining to veterans

Inform veterans, their dependents, and survivors as to their rights and benefits under federal and state legislation, or local ordinances.

Assist veterans, their dependents, and their beneficiaries in the preparation, presentation, proof, and establishment of such claims, privileges, rights and other benefits accruing to them under federal, state, and local laws.

Report any evidence of incompetence, or negligence on the part of any employee dealing with veterans' affairs.

Promote and protect the rights of Georgia's veterans under federal and state law.

Apply for and accept gifts, grants, and other contributions from the federal government or from any other governmental units the state to assist all veterans,

Construct and operate nursing homes and personal care homes for the benefit of eligible war veterans.

Assist in obtaining special motor vehicle license plates for certain veterans: Medal of Honor and Purple Heart recipients, former prisoners-of-war, handicapped and disabled veterans, and retired military personnel.

VETERANS EDUCATION AND TRAINING State Approving Agency

B y law, the Georgia Department of Veterans Service is designated as the State Approving Agency, responsible for approving and supervising all institutions and establishments in Georgia, which offer education and training under the provisions of the Veterans Educational Assistance Program.

The State Approving Agency (SAA) has the function of ensuring that approved institutions and establishments meet and maintain acceptable standards so that eligible persons who attend may receive educational assistance from the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs.

This includes all public and private schools and all establishments offering apprenticeship and other on-the-job training. The satisfactory performance of these duties requires extensive knowledge in education administration and understanding the laws and regulations that govern and control the Veterans Educational Assistance Program.

Georgia veterans enrolled in college degree and professional programs, technical career programs, vocational programs, to include flight training and on-the-job training programs exceeded 26,092 during 2013.

The Montgomery GI Bill education program, initiated in 1985, remains a great success. This program expanded the education benefits program to include vocational, technical, flight, correspondence, and apprenticeship training for reservists and veterans.

"The Post-9/11 Veterans Education Assistance Act of 2008," the newest education benefit program expanded the benefits available to certain service members and veterans with active duty military service after September 11, 2001. This GI Bill program was implemented on August 1, 2009. More than 17,200 Georgia veterans used this GI Bill during 2013.

Congress passed the Post 9/11 Veterans Educational Assistance Improvements Act of 2010 and it was signed by the president. This bill makes significant improvements such as adding OJT/ Apprenticeship and Non-College degree schools, Vocational schools and Flight schools to what is covered under the Post 9/11 GI Bill. The changes were effective October 1, 2011.

This new GI Bill has been described as "the most comprehensive education benefits package since the original GI Bill was signed into law in 1944." For veterans qualified at the 100% tier, the program pays tuition and fees, a housing allowance, and a book stipend.

The Department of Defense has approved a "Transferability of Education Benefits" option for the Post - 9/11 GI Bill. This is a DOD retention program requiring active duty veterans to commit to a four year extension to their six or more year active duty commitment. DOD eligibility requirements must be met.

In 2013, the approval of educational institutions and training establishments for the education of Georgia veterans resulted in the processing of 6,460 individual actions in the approval, re-approval, withdrawal and compliance survey process. The State Approving Agency also conducted regular inspection visits to ensure that approval criteria and schools' standards of progress are being followed as prescribed by law. The SAA began conducting compliance survey inspections in FY 2013 using VA standards.

During 2013, personnel assigned to the Veterans Educational and Training Division conducted about 193235 visits for the purpose of approval, re-approval, inspection and compliance surveys. Currently, the department monitors more than 1,576 educational institutions and training establishments.

In 2013, GDVS continued to expand opportunities for Georgia veterans to receive their Education Benefits while enrolled in approved On-The-Job Training (OJT) and Apprenticeship programs. For more information on all GI Bill programs go to: www.benefits.va.gov/gibill.

PUBLIC INFORMATION DIVISION

The Public Information Division collects, evaluates, and disseminates information to veterans regarding benefits changes in laws, and proper procedures to be followed in the filing of claims.

When appropriate, the division mails news and information releases concerning veterans affairs to newspapers, radio and television stations throughout Georgia.

The releases are used to inform veterans about the latest changes regarding veterans affairs and to provide information on the status of proposed or pending legislation which may affect them. benefits.

Through an aggressive internal communication program, the Division keeps the field offices informed about changes in the law and policy interpretations that impact veterans.

The Public Information Division maintains the department's online presence, including its website and several social media channels.

Veterans, their families, and all others interested in veteran-related news are encouraged to follow @gavetsvc on Twitter, where the department is leveraging the social media service to share the latest

Field personnel promote the department and the services it provides by their frequent contacts with the news media in their respective areas.

Public speaking forums are an important ingredient of the department's overall information program. All department personnel are encouraged to accept speaking engagements at meetings of veterans organizations and civic clubs. These personal

The Public Information Division compiles, edits, and publishes a series of pamphlets explaining in detail the various benefits available to veterans, their dependents, and survivors. These pamphlets are updated as changes occur in laws, regulations, or Georgia Department of Veterans Service information.

The website contains news releases, information about Commissioner Wheeler, state veterans benefits, the Georgia War Veterans Nursing Home in Augusta, the Georgia War Veterans Home in Milledgeville, the Georgia Veterans Memorial Cemeteries in Milledgeville and Glennville, locations of the Field Offices, and approved OJT/Apprenticeships facilities.





GEORGIA WAR VETERANS NURSING HOME

The Georgia War Veterans Nursing Home in Augusta is a 192-bed skilled nursing care facility located adjacent to the campus of Georgia Regents University and the Charlie Norwood Veterans Affairs Medical Center.

Georgia War Veterans Nursing Home is operated under an interagency agreement between the Georgia Department of Veterans Service and Georgia Regents University.

Primarily, the facility provides medical and skilled nursing services to Georgia's aged and infirm war veterans. Georgia War Veterans Nursing Home also serves as a teaching facility to acquaint medical, dental, pharmacy, and allied health students with the medical conditions and diseases of the aged. This provides students with practical experience and helps them gain expertise



Services to patients included 5,674 physical therapy treatments and 4,519 individual occupational therapy procedures.

Veteran patients were treated by a medical director and family medicine residents providing daily physician coverage. Other services were provided by a certified activities therapist and staff, two facility social workers and a staff of registered, licensed practical nurses and certified nursing assistants.

To help provide care and treatment, the federal government, through the Department of Veterans Affairs, provided financial assistance totaling in excess of \$5.7 million during fiscal year 2013.

Throughout the year, veteran service organizations, civic and fraternal organizations and religious groups demonstrated their concern for the well-

in treating the disabled and the elderly.

Also located at the facility is a GDVS Veterans Field Service Office that serves veterans of Richmond and Columbia counties.

Dedicated in 1969, the facility was the first of its kind in the nation to be built with financial grant assistance from the federal government. It is one of a select group of such institutions that is accredited by the Joint Commission.

In fiscal year 2013, the nursing home provided 59,709 days of care to Georgia's veterans with an average age of 83. During the year, there were 275 admissions and 284 discharges with an average length of stay of 196 days.

GEORGIA WAR VETERANS HOME

The Georgia War Veterans Home, situated on approximately 17 acres in Milledgeville, is a 375-bed facility licensed and certified by the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs to provide skilled nursing care to aged and infirm Georgia war veterans. United Veteran Services of Georgia, Inc., a subsidiary of UHS-Pruitt Corporation of Norcross, operates the home for the Department of Veterans Service under a contractual agreement. In 2013, veteran patients at the home received 79,787 days of skilled nursing care. The nursing home admitted 151 patients during the year and had 77 discharges/deaths. The average length of stay for current skilled veteran patients is 1,335 days or 3.6 years.

Federal assistance in funding a portion of the cost of providing care to veterans in the home amounted to \$8,977,640. As in previous years, many veterans

The home operated three skilled nursing care facilities in 2013, which included the Richard B. Russell Building with 86 budgeted beds; the Joe T Wood Building with 140 budgeted beds; and the Alzheimer's Wing of the Pete Wheeler Building with 24 budgeted beds.

The GDVS field office serving Baldwin, Hancock, Putnam, Washington, and



service organizations, civic groups, and church groups continued their sponsorship of numerous activities such as movies, games, dance parties, bingo, picnics, and other activities and programs for the general well-being of the veteran patients at the home. Groups and individuals that comprised the equivalent of 1,426 individual volunteers providing in excess of 5,264 hours of

Wilkinson counties is located in the Wheeler Building Rotunda. Veteran-related contacts for this field office totaled 17,089 for 2013. This office also serves the 250 veterans of the Georgia War Veterans Home by assisting with compensation and pension claims, counseling services, and family-related issues.

The Office of Regulatory Services of the Georgia Department of Human Resources conducted an unannounced licensure survey of each skilled nursing unit in January 2013 and found no deficiencies. The U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs conducted its annual survey in July; the home was determined to be in compliance with VA standards and was certified for continued operation as a state veterans home. time valued at over \$114,702.56 presented over 535 activities during the year.

The value of in-kind donations made available to the home was \$37,940.00. Groups and individuals also provided direct monetary donations of \$29,719.00 during the year.

GVMC - MILLEDGEVILLE

Georgia Veterans Memorial Cemetery at Milledgeville is located approximately 5 miles south of downtown Milledgeville along Georgia Highway 112. This cemetery, established on 142 acres the Georgia Department of Veterans Service received from the Georgia Forestry Commission, includes an administration/visitor center with a state of the art information booth, a committal chapel, a carillon, and 12 columbarium shelters for cremations. Cemetery grounds also

include a six-acre lake and a three-acre, multitier walled ceremonial area available for use by veterans organizations on remembrance days, such as Memorial Day and Veterans Day.

In May 2011, construction was completed on Phase II of the cemetery. This phase encompassed about 10

acres and added approximately 1,300 casketed burial plots and 600 cremation plots in the cemetery. The cemetery will eventually be the final resting place for more than 100,000 eligible veterans, their spouses and eligible dependents.

There were 203 burials in 2013, making the total-to-date 2,127 veterans, spouses, and dependents buried at the GVMC. The burials are composed of 1,494 casketed burials, 367 cremations in the columbarium, 309 in-ground cremations, and 21 memorial markers.

The avenue of flags is displayed when ceremonies are held at the cemetery, such as Memorial Day and Wreaths Across America. In addition, it is displayed on Flag Day, Independence Day, and Veterans Day.

Flags were placed on all burial sites and at the front entrance of the cemetery in recognition of Memorial Day. The Knights of Columbus, Patriot Guard, and members of the 48th Infantry Brigade conducted a ceremony attended by approximately 300 people. Flags were placed on all burial sites in the cemetery in recognition of Veterans Day.

On December 14, 2013, the cemetery hosted its annual Wreaths Across America ceremony honoring our past and present military. Seven wreaths, provided by the Worchester Wreath Company, were presented honoring each branch of our Armed Forces, Merchant Marines and POWs/MIAs. The ceremony included members of the Patriot Guard Riders, Honor Guards from the Augusta Composite Squadron Civil Air



Patrol and Putnam County High School, cadets from Georgia Military College Prep School, and representatives from each branch of service. The cemetery received approximately 1700 donated wreaths, which were placed on graves following the

ceremony. This was the first year that wreaths were placed on every grave in the cemetery.

The cemetery has many visitors each year. Some are visiting grave sites, some are seeking information about the cemetery and burial requirements, and many have just heard about the cemetery and want to see the grounds.

Cemetery staff members remain active in the local community by meeting frequently with business groups, veterans organizations, and church groups.

The GVMC's hours of operation are Monday through Friday 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m., excluding official state holidays. The cemetery is open to families, visitors and the general public seven days each week from 8 a.m. to dusk.

GVMC - GLENVILLE

Georgia Veterans Memorial Cemetery – Glennville is situated on the 42.6acre site of the former Dyess Farm, just north of the Glennville city limits on U.S. Highway 301, 25 miles west of the main post of Fort Stewart. The initial 26-acre phase of the cemetery contains 1,400 pre-placed in-ground double vaults, for eligible veterans, their spouses, and eligible dependents; 766 conventional single depth sites; 1,384 cremation interment sites,

which include a columbarium and in-ground sites; and 429 spaces for memorial markers. These memorial markers are placed in memory of those veterans whose remains

are unavailable for burial.

GVMC–Glennville was dedicated on November 28, 2007, and will eventually be the final resting place for more than 21,000 veterans, their spouses, and eligible dependents. As of December 31, 2013, there were 604 veterans, spouses, and family members interred.

A key feature of the cemetery is the colocation of the Glennville Veterans Field Service Office, which provides assistance to veterans and their families in Bryan, Liberty, Long, Tattnall, and Wayne counties.

In 2013, GVMC–Glennville hosted its annual Memorial Day ceremony to honor veterans who paid the ultimate sacrifice in service of our country. The ceremony was held in conjunction with the Glennville American Legion post and the Glennville Veterans of Foreign Wars post. Mr. Andy Quinney performed Taps during the ceremony. Lt. Col. Lee T. Overby, Commander of Fort Stewart's 1st Battalion 76th Field Artillery Regiment, was the guest speaker for the ceremony. He took the opportunity to inform the crowd of the importance of Memorial Day as a time to honor today's soldiers as well as soldiers of the past who have all sacrificed. Also, Cemetery Director Ernie Cowart spoke of the beginnings of the holiday to its place in today's world and welcomed the crowd to the cemetery, as over 200 people attended the ceremony during a beautiful spring day.

For Memorial Day and Veterans Day, Boy



Scout Troop 929 placed U.S. flags at the grave sites of the veterans interred in the cemetery. In December, the Bonaventure Children of the American Revolution Society sponsored a Wreaths Across

America ceremony to place wreaths at all the interment sites in the cemetery. The Air Force JROTC of Effingham County High School took part in the ceremony and provided the color guard. Stephanie Lawless, director of the Toombs County High School Band, performed "Taps." Also involved in the ceremony were members of the Brunswick Civil Air Patrol and area Boy Scouts. A crowd of around 200 people attended the ceremony and then helped place wreaths at the graves.

Cemetery staff members remain active in the local community by meeting frequently with business groups, veterans organizations, and other various groups.

GVMC–Glennville's hours of operation are Monday through Friday 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m., excluding official state holidays. The cemetery is open to families, visitors, and the general public seven days each week from 8 a.m. to dusk.

STATISTICAL REPORT DEFINITIONS

OFFICE VISIT: A visit to a Veterans Field Service Office by a veteran, family member, or other interested individual to inquire about, or make application for, veterans benefits provided by the federal government or the State of Georgia. It includes the provision of advice and assistance to the individual(s), the completion of forms or other correspondence or documentation related to veterans benefits.

OTHER VISIT: A telephone call, email, mail or telefax made to or received from a veteran, family member, or other interested individual to inquire or advise about veterans benefits provided by the federal government or the State of Georgia. It includes the provision of advice and assistance to the individual(s).

HEARING: A hearing is conducted by the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs to review and adjudicate an appeal of a previous decision by the VA and is conducted by a hearing officer or judge of the VA. It includes the preparation by a claims and appeals officer (VCAO) and the actual presentation at the formal hearing in person or by electronic means by a VCAO.

The following categories include the initiation and/or completion of an application for benefits as defined:

COMPENSATION AND PENSION: Claims for monetary benefits submitted by veterans, dependents, or survivors.

DIC AND DEATH PENSION: Dependents Indemnity Compensation and Death Pension.

ELIGIBILITY VERIFICATION REPORT: Required for pension benefits and/or the annual certification of income for medical benefits.

EDUCATION, TRAINING, AND VOCATIONAL REHABILITATION: Includes educational benefits at an institution of higher learning, on-the-job training, or apprenticeship training, as provided in the current educational benefits of the "GI Bill." Referral to the GDVS Veterans Education & Training Division or the VA Regional Office Educational Benefits office is included as part of this service or transaction.

NOD AND APPEALS: Notice of Disagreement or Appeal related to a claim application for VA benefits.

MEDICAL: Treatment of medical or dental conditions, admission to health care facilities, and vocational rehabilitation.

INSURANCE AND BURIALS: Insurance claims and applications for burial benefits (grave markers and interment in veterans cemeteries).

LOANS, POWERS OF ATTORNEY, AND CHANGES OF ADDRESS: Loan benefits, advice on eligibility requirements, normal processing methods, etc.; applications for designation of power of attorney for GDVS to act on behalf of the veteran with VA claims actions; advice on making a change of address using VA's processes.

ADVICE: Advice provided to a veteran or family member about benefits. As a result of advice provided to a client, other services or transactions may be provided at the same time or at a later visit.

DRIVER'S LICENSE: Georgia Veteran's Driver's License, Honorary Driver's License, or National Guard Driver's License.

BUSINESS LICENSE: Certificates issued to certain disabled veterans exempting them from the payment of business license taxes.

STATE VETERANS HOME APPLICATION: Admission to a State Veterans Home.

LICENSE PLATES: Commemorative service, disabled veteran, military award, etc.

NATURAL RESOURCES: A park pass provided to eligible veterans and the submission of the application to the GDVS Central Office for approval and issuance.

TAX EXEMPTIONS: Tax exemptions for which the veteran may be eligible.

PREFERENCE POINTS: Provision of paperwork documenting service in the U.S. Armed Forces for use in employment application to State of Georgia.

WELFARE ASSISTANCE: Advice regarding an application for welfare benefits.

Compensation and Pension: Benefits expenditures for the following categories: compensation payments, pension payments, Dependency and Indemnity Compensation, and burial allowances.

Medical Care: Operating expenses incurred through the provision of health care services to veterans. The specific programs reported for this category are: medical care, General Post Fund, medical and prosthetic research, and miscellaneous accounts.

Construction: Funding for Major Projects, Minor Projects, Grants for Construction of State Extended Care Facilities, and Grants for Construction of State Veterans Cemeteries.

Insurance and Indemnities: Expenditures for death claims, matured endowments, dividends, cash surrender payments, total disability income provision payments, and total and permanent disability benefits payments.

Education and Vocational Rehabilitation:

Expenditures in this category include: automobile and adaptive equipment, specially adapted housing, Survivors' and Dependents' Educational Assistance (Chapter 35), Vocational Rehabilitation for Disabled Veterans (Chapter 31), Post-Vietnam Era Veterans' Educational Assistance (Chapter 32), Montgomery G.I. Bill for Selected Reserves (Chapter 1606), Reserve Educational Assistance Program (Chapter 1607), Montgomery G.I. Bill (Chapter 30), Post-9/11 Veterans Educational Assistance (Chapter 33).

General Operating Costs: General Operating Expenses represent the costs necessary to provide administration and oversight for the benefits provided by VA. This includes costs for overhead and human resources [to operate VA's regional office, hospitals, health clinics, nursing homes, and domiciliary facilities in Georgia]. This category does not include payments made directly to beneficiaries.

Thank you for the opportunity to share with you some of the accomplishments and events that took place at the Atlanta Regional Office (RO) during fiscal year (FY) 2013 which ended on September 30, 2013. Last year was another busy year for both of our organizations.

During FY13 we continued our transformation from a paper based claims processing system to a self-service, electronic claims processing environment. We ended the FY with 95% of all pending rating claims available electronically. During the year we continued to focus on reducing our oldest pending claims nationwide and had much success.

Veterans Service Center (Compensation)

During FY13, the Veterans Service Center (VSC) completed 37,708 rating claims with an average of 357.7 days to complete a claim. The number of completed claims was an increase of 4% over the number of claims processed in FY12. During FY13 we focused on completing our oldest pending claims which resulted in a higher average days to complete. In FY14, the VSC will continue to focus on reducing the rating inventory of claims pending more than 125 days as well as reaching the 2015 goal of 98% quality.

The Atlanta VSC received 36,454 claims last year, which represents a 4.3% decrease in claims received compared to FY12.

The Intergrated Disability Evaluation System (IDES) is at three Army installations and two Air Force Bases in the state of Georgia: Fort Stewart, Fort Benning, Fort Gordon, Moody Air Force Base, and Robins Air Force Base. The IDES program involves coordination between VA and the Department of Defense (DoD) to ensure expedited claims processing for Servicemembers going through the Medical Evaluation Board process.

The Military Service Coordinators (MSCs) continue to be involved with events held throughout Georgia and other locations for the purpose of providing VA entitlement information. Additionally, MSCs conduct outreach activities that include TAP/DTAP briefings at Moody AFB, Warner Robins AFB, Fort Stewart, Hunter AAF, Fort Gordon, Fort Benning, and the Marine Corps Logistics Base in Albany. In FY13, the Benefits Delivery at Discharge (BDD) sites integrated into the Veterans Benefits Management System (VBMS) to deploy full integration of the Veterans Benefits Administration (VBA) Transformation Plan.

In FY14, the Atlanta RO continues to lead the way through Transformation with the enhancements of VBMS. Currently, the Atlanta RO has approximately 98% of its rating inventory in the digital environment.

In order to be successful with Secretary Shinseki's Transformation Plan to eliminate Veteran homelessness by the 2015, the Homeless Veterans Coordinator has become involved in all stages of the claims process to expedite development. Currently, the Atlanta RO has a total of 77 homeless claims pending and is meeting the homeless average days pending goal of 75 days.

Education

The Atlanta Regional Processing Office (RPO) is responsible for 7.8% of the nationwide education benefits workload.

The RPO processed 601,166 claims in FY13 while maintaining a payment accuracy rate of 98.3%. The Average Days to Complete for original claims processing improved from 45.2 days in FY12 to 38.8 days in FY13, a decrease of 14.2%. The Average Days to Complete for supplemental claims processing improved from 18.5 days in FY12 to 13.1 days in FY13, resulting in a decrease of 29.2%.

In FY13, the automation of Post 9/11 GI Bill supplemental claims had a positive effect on reducing timeliness and inventory. The Long Term Solution (LTS) fully automated approximately 40% of the supplemental Post 9/11 GI Bill claims electronically received and partially automated another 35%. It is anticipated that automation will continue to improve the RPO's performance going into FY14.

The effectiveness of automation has allowed for the reorganization of the Education business line. As of June 17, 2013, one hundred (100) Atlanta RPO Education employees were transitioned to the VSC to assist in meeting the Secretary's goal to reduce the backlog of claims. As a result of this initiative, the jurisdictional authority over the states of Florida and South Carolina were shifted to the Muskogee RPO. The Atlanta RPO continues to have jurisdiction for the states of Georgia, North Carolina, and Puerto Rico and surrounding islands.

In the area of Customer Service, the RPO assisted 25,864 students via Internet inquiries and interviewed 9,595 students visiting the RPO. The Outreach section presented information at 25 outreach events during FY13 providing information to school certifying officials and veterans. The Education Call Center, located in

Muskogee, Oklahoma, continues to handle all education telephone inquiries nationwide.

Loan Guaranty

FY13 marked the second year for the national Certificate of Eligibility program at the Atlanta Regional Loan Center (RLC). During FY13, we made 413,414 eligibility determinations and answered 221,554 phone calls. As a national call center, our Loan Production staff continues to provide "ICARE" service which is evidenced by positive feedback received from Veterans, their beneficiaries, and participating lenders.

The Atlanta RLC continued to be a leader in the nation in the number of VA loans closed with 89,969 for FY13. This accomplishment represents more than seven consecutive years in the top two performing RLCs in the nation in this category. During this period, the Atlanta RLC generated approximately 14.5% of all VA loans closed nationally. During FY13, our Construction & Valuation Section processed 61,132 appraisals, which ranked first among the eight Regional Loan Centers.

Our Loan Production and Loan Administration staffs continued to provide training and outreach to lenders and real estate professionals who assist Veterans in utilizing the loan guaranty benefit. During this past year, we attended over 18 outreach events and had direct contact with over 1,046 program participants. We participated in the Annual Supermarket Event for Veterans, sponsored by your office, and will continue to support this event in the future.

Our Loan Administration staff assisted 5,305 Veterans and their families in avoiding foreclosure through one of our successful alternatives. We approved 167 Specially Adapted Housing (SAH) grants totaling \$8.76 million dollars to our most deserving disabled Veterans. The delivery of the SAH grant benefit continues to be our most rewarding accomplishment and our highest priority.

Vocational Rehabilitation and Employment

The Atlanta Vocational Rehabilitation and Employment Division (VR&E) maintains an active workload, which is the fifth largest in the nation, with an open case count of 4,866 as of September 30, 2013. In FY13, our office received 4,192 applications for VR&E services.

Independent Living (IL) services provided by this office represented approximately 10% of all IL cases nationwide. The program, designed for Veterans whose disabilities would prevent them from participating in competitive employment, seeks goals for independent functioning in the home and community, to the maximum extent possible.

The VR&E division continues early outreach with Servicemembers preparing for discharge from active duty. This outreach is conducted at Fort Gordon, Fort Benning, Fort Stewart, and Robins Air Force Base. Part of the outreach includes a one-time vocational and career counseling assessment for Servicemembers who are within six months of discharge or have been discharged from active duty in the last 12 months. In FY13, we completed 486 assessments as part of this outreach. VR&E counselors also can begin the steps of the Chapter 31 initial assessment, entitlement determination, adjustment counseling, vocational exploration, and service delivery in preparation for their transition to civilian work upon their return home. This year we also hired four IDES Counselors, who are co-located with the DoD personnel. These Counselors are tasked with supporting all IDES Servicemembers.

Conclusion

As we enter 2014, we continue to focus on improving the timeliness of claims processing while increasing the quality of our decisions. Our goal continues to be to improve all the services that we provide to Georgia Veterans and Veterans across the country. We continue to strive to increase our role as advocates for our Veterans and their families. I am thankful for the outstanding partnership that we have in our joint effort to provide services to Georgia Veterans. We look forward to this relationship continuing to grow this year. We look forward to working with you and your staff serving Veterans in 2014. Thank you for your efforts and support during the year.
